Gruesome murder of Roy O'Leary, a village mourns!

Roy O'Leary, 76, who lived at Albion House, Highthorpe, was a very wealthy man, having inherited family money and made more through wise investments. Heated lunch

O'Leary had seen all the people named above at lunch, between 1 and 3 yesterday afternoon, after which he announced that he was going to his study to rewrite his will. (Rumour has it that the lunch was a rather heated affair.) All remained at the house throughout the afternoon. It does, though, also have patio doors leading onto the garden, which were normally kept locked. They can be opened with a key (held by O'Leary) from the outside, or a handle from the inside. They are shut simply by being pulled or pushed.

Lack of will

Although O'Leary said that he was going to be rewriting his will, and he was found seated at his desk with writing materials out, no will has been found at the scene.
